Minister's Musings

"We are writing this so that our joy may be complete." (1 John 1:4)

Ever wondered how God is working in your life? Ever feel a call you can't ignore, or have a belief so strong, it's surprising how God can change your plans?

For as long as I can remember, I never wanted to give birth to a baby. I was so adamant that I'm sure it disappointed my mum that I'd never give her a grandchild by birth. I always felt that there were so many children in social services that needed homes, why not adopt from there?

Well, time went on and as I grew and saw more and more babies, I still felt the same way, maybe even stronger, that adopting a school-age child that needed a home was more up my alley than giving birth to a baby. I always thought that "thing" growing inside of me would be like an alien, never mind the communication problems when baby would be born! Why are you crying?! I've changed the diaper; I've fed you; I've burped you and I've swaddled you, now sleep! It was never part of my constitution to fathom having a baby.

You'd think that while being a minister and doing baptisms, I'd melt with the opportunity of having a baby in my arms, and not want to "give them back". Sadly, I enjoy giving them back; babies were cute, but I just didn't "get them".

Let's journey a bit more in my history... When I finished my theological training I was matched with a congregation in Saskatchewan so I moved from Ottawa. I was single and enjoying living on my own. I often wondered if I'd be financially secure so as to grow a family, because I wasn't confident I'd find a partner living in small town (5000 people), SK.

After a year and a half of being in SK, I re-connected with Penny and we did the long distance relationship thing. We had many common goals and interests: we both like turrets on houses, she had kids already (so no baby), and we were both interested in adopting a school age child from social services, or perhaps even being a foster family for children needing a home. It was great!



We were a match in so many ways, but the "baby issue" was not an issue at all; Penny had had her babies and there was no pressure for me to have a baby.

Well, I moved to BC in the fall of 2010. Work started out well, but then took a turn for stressful and disappointing times. I found new work that brought me a commute to Abbotsford. After that short term contract, I was delighted to accept an appointment at DLUC! Things started to pick up! I was constantly wondering if life would settle down. Once having relative job security with DLUC, Penny and I started talking about adoption, from social services. Seemed like a great avenue for us to pursue. We did the reference checks, the visits, and were about to start classes when things started changing...

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The Day Cancer Paid a Visit

Tuesday, September 10th, 2013 began like most other days. Pat and I had breakfast and discussed the day ahead. I'd have lunch with my mom in Ladner, but be home early in the afternoon. Pat had a few chores to do in the morning before having her annual mammogram.

Pat was still out when I arrived home. I puttered around and then the phone rang. It was her doctor's office. "When Pat gets home, she needs to come to the office immediately." No explanation was necessary.

Pat was crying when she came through the door. Soon we were both sobbing. We drove to her doctor's, unable to share our thoughts. We were ushered into the office and Pat's mammogram result was lying on the table. "It looks like cancer," was her doctor's stark opinion. (It turned out to be a reoccurrence from 10 years before.)

I thought to myself, "This only ever happens to someone else." Thus began a journey down a road I never thought we'd be on. (Before the mammogram, life had become routine. Life and living were taken for granted.)

The doctor made an appointment with a breast cancer specialist for two days later. Pat and I had booked a month-long cruise to Australia and we wondered if we should go. "Please do," said the specialist. "It won't adversely affect the outcome."

Two days after we returned home, a pre-scheduled biopsy confirmed the mammogram finding. This set in motion a whirlwind of nine appointments in the next eight days ... plastic sur-

geon (reconstruction), bone scan, abdominal ultrasound, heart scan, etc.


Pat's surgery took place on November 12th and as soon as she was physically able, she began her chemotherapy.

We hear all kinds of stories about how our medical system fails so many folks, and I believe they're true. However, Pat's experience has been amazing. It's like she'd been fast-tracked from the beginning. And the compassion shown by the various cancer clinic staff simply can't be overstated: from the friendly receptionists to the gentle "chemo nurses".

I was particularly moved by the young woman singing gentle ballads in a reception area as patients quietly awaited their turn for "self-injection" lessons.

Chemotherapy isn't easy ... it's not for sissies. And as tough as it sometimes gets, it seems patients get strength by encouraging others as they too go through their own rough spots.

Pat's courage has been amazing and her positive attitude has helped her manage the tough times.

Pat and I would prefer not to be going down this particular road of course, but it does come with some blessings. Pat and I are facing our own mortality. We appreciate, more now than ever, that we have only a finite amount of time together. Those issues that were so important less than six months ago seem trivial today. A passion has returned to our relationship. We hug and kiss more now than we did when we were courting ... well, O.K. ... perhaps not quite.

Cancer draws family and friends together and our Deer Lake family has been phenomenal. We have been inspired by others who have already been along this path, and those who haven't have boosted us with their love and encouragement. We are blessed.

Cancer IS bad ... but it isn't necessarily ALL bad.

Christian Education

Christian Education is available to everyone in the congregation. We offer Sunday School classes for our children which is one of our main jobs. We can have from 1 or 2 children each week to 30 during high season!

We follow the Whole People of God Curriculum which follows the lectionary that is used during Worship. As well as working to impart knowledge – we see our goal in Sunday school to welcome the children and youth, be examples of the teachings of Jesus and let them know by example that this is a place that loves and cares for them.

To quote a from a letter written to The Observer this month, "what I remember from my Sunday School years most, is not the crafts or the theology, but that some people had time for me and loved me."

We also offer Bible study classes for the adults and various youth events. We maintain the Nursery, help in the Intergenerational services, organize the year end picnic, as well as put on a Christmas pageant.

There are various retreats and con-

ferences which are available throughout the year and the Christian Education committee helps arrange for any grants or applications that need to be filled out. This past year, 8 of our children and youth attended these events which help them get to know the broader church and those of their age attending other United churches near and far. They come back enthused by the experience and anxious to attend such events again.

Many of us feel that we couldn't possibly join this committee because we aren't bona fide teachers, or that we don't have enough biblical background to teach effectively. Nothing could be further from the truth! The old adage is absolutely true: you really don't know anything about a topic until you have to teach it.

If teaching really isn't for you, perhaps joining the committee itself would fulfill a gap for you. We can always use more fresh ideas, insights and experience. Teaching Sunday school is not a prerequisite to joining the Christian Education Committee. However, it does help if you can bake!

People who like writing and who would enjoy interviewing their fellow Deer Lakers. An apprentice who is proficient using Word would also be nice. Someone who would like to learn how to lay out and publish the newsletter.

At some point, Jim or I will want to move on. We think we have a good thing going in the Lakeshore Lines and we'd like to see it continue.

Finance Committee

Most of us don't think of our church as a business. We meet here every Sunday to worship together, to pray and sing, and to shore ourselves up for the week ahead.

We also come to work on our many projects, to put our faith into action by volunteering for this community or for the wider community outside these walls. And of course, we come for the fellowship – to connect with each other, and deepen our friendships. This is what we think of as our church.

But our church is also a business. There are bills to be paid, records to be kept, and tax receipts to be written. We must pay our staff in accordance with federal and provincial law. We have to maintain our charitable status with the Canada Revenue Agency.

We must comply with good audit practices. The business side of Deer Lake must be attended to day in and day out, every week of the year.

Your Finance Committee is the committee that asks "How's business?" The members of your Finance Committee are Tony W, Mary C, Kathy R (who is also your envelope secretary) and Cathy M, your treasurer.

We serve this church by administering the finances on a day-to-day basis. We watch over the bottom line, and do our best to ensure that the business of Deer Lake is well-run. We don't have regular monthly meetings, but we do touch base with each other whenever necessary to run this business as best we can.

With four people on the Finance Committee right now, we aren't actively searching for new members. But the issues and information the Finance Committee deals with concern us all, as we try to remain financially viable. Any aspect of the business of this church we love is open to every congregation member.

You can approach any one of us with your questions or concerns about the financial side of Deer Lake - where our money comes from, how it is being spent. Feel free to ask us "How's business?"

Pastoral Care and Worship (Liturgical Arts)

My name is Shirley McG and I am chair of Pastoral Care. Pastoral Care meetings are on the second Tuesday of the month at lpm. The committee members are myself, Kellee M, Trish S, Mary C and Rev. Tracy.

We meet and discuss any joys and concerns of the congregants of Deer Lake. Trish is the Sunshine person who sends cards to anyone we feel needs to be remembered. It could be a birth, death, someone who is ill or just someone who needs some TLC. Please let us know of any pastoral concerns you know of. We need YOUR help to make sure everyone who needs a card or a visit has just that.

Tracy does a lot of Pastoral visiting each month. If you would like her to call, just say so!

Under the umbrella of Pastoral Care are 14 Care Ringers who usually phone at least once a month to let you know of "happenings" in the church. They will also ask how you are. If you need any help, this is the time to let your Care Ringer know.

A Care Ringer is someone who likes to phone people and is a caring individual. If this is something you would enjoy doing, please talk to myself, Kellee, Trish or Mary.

Also under the umbrella of Pastoral Care is the Friendship Garden at the front of the church. It really needs the TLC of a member of the congregation who loves gardening and maybe lives in an apartment without access to a garden. Some of those who were looking after the garden

have problems of their own and would like someone else to step up to the plate. Please let me know if you would like to take this task on. Thank you.

Welcoming is part of Pastoral Care. Mary Cazalet is usually the Greeter, along with anyone else who wishes to do so. She takes care of newcomer's and offers them a form to complete. From there the secretary ensures a name tag is completed so that everyone should have one.

I'm deviating to Worship now! Janice spoke on worship two weeks ago but forgot to mention that liturgical Arts is also part of worship.

We would like to have someone who likes decorating to join us on the worship committee. liturgical Arts is looking after decorating the church for the different seasons and changing the banners at the front of the church. It can be quite a rewarding job. The bulletin boards in the Narthex need to be changed periodically too.

We provide a sounding board, support, and supervision to help encourage good working relationships and communication with and between our 7+ staff, the church's various committees and the congregation. 
- 1. Managing the building contingency fund

City of Architecture, Food, Wine, Music and Sun!

Arriving in Buenos Aires, the capital of Argentina, on New Year's Day finds a country closed up after a celebration. One slow immigration line, no cambio, and lots of families in parks barbequing, escaping the heat wave which recently brought BA to a standstill.

Our taxi driver, Alexandro, took us efficiently to our hotel in the San Telmo district of BA, and we checked in, and sank onto the bed after a long trip. We did find the small pool on the top floor of the hotel for the dying minutes of the summer sun, and then started to think about dinner.

Everything had seemed closed, but as we wandered around San Telmo, we saw a city awakening to new life. San Telmo is a bit like Vancouver's Commercial Drive on steroids. Magnificent old buildings from the city's heyday 80 years ago, are now adorned in beautiful creative graffiti. Wonderful old restaurants and bars are tucked away everywhere, but keep a watch on your pockets and bags. And don't stare too hard at the graffiti art, because you'll step in a pothole, or broken glass or what the dog ate yesterday. So it's Havana with a touch of New Orleans.

We wandered down Defensa St looking for food, and soon we heard music, getting louder. Coming out onto Dorrego Plaza, we found dozens of tables, and a tango dance floor. We sat down and ordered Quilmes beer in the hot evening. Humanity was at work - families, groups of young folk, Dads chasing toddlers, lovers kissing, and foreigners watching the tango show. The perfect introduction to a new culture! So we ordered porterhouse steak (Tony) and eggplant (Peggy) and more beer.

Then a live band turned up to accompany the dancers, who brought round a hat at the end of each show. But as we finished dinner, we heard drums. Of all kinds. And it got louder. Finally the tango musicians gave up and the street performing drummers took over the sound waves of the square, with the big drum echoing off the buildings. Like the Pied Piper they sucked the people out of the bars and to their street concert. Then they paraded around the square with the crowd following. It was a grand welcome to Argentina!

We spent 2 more weeks exploring Buenos Aires, Argentina and Uruguay, and we promised ourselves to return. 
in this as everything lined up perfectly with appointments, specialists, and timing.

Penny said, on the way to one particular appointment, "We'll see a sign if this is right." Lo and behold, the date given to us for blood work to confirm pregnancy was January 6th – Epiphany! For a minister... this was a pretty big sign that God had a hand in this!

I'm still nervous and sometimes terrified of what pregnancy will bring my way, of how I'm to hold and coddle an infant and soothe those crying fits. I'm still not a huge "baby person" but I know I can love and nurture the new child that Penny and I will bring into this world. I love my vocation so much, and Penny knows me so well, that we have decided that after our September delivery, I will take four months of maternity leave and Penny will follow after that with six months of parental leave. I can't see myself staying home longer than that, and Penny would like an opportunity to bond more closely with baby and have some time off too.

I know to some people there is pain about not conceiving their own child, and painful stories about loss, and adoption. My goal in this article is not to dismiss or negate the feelings with those experiences, but to offer you an insight in how Penny and I came to this decision. Some people may be struggling with a lesbian couple procreating, and that it may seem unnatural or inappropriate, and I respect those feelings as well, however, this journey that Penny and I face, includes you, the congregation, and we hope we can lean on you for support and care in the coming months.

There will be a new face to our congregation and we hope you can welcome him/her with as open arms as you did my family in the beginning. There is something divine in my family plan, as a minister, as a Christian, I have to believe that, for God has called favourably on our hearts to journey down this path. "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you, and before you were born I consecrated you; I appointed you a prophet to the nations." (Jer. 1: 5). There will be a new cry, and hopefully it's a cry of joy as we grow together.

WHAT'S IN A PRAYER?

Some of you might not know it, but Rev. Tracy has little to do with the prayers of the people each week. We are gifted at Deer Lake to have a team of committed, skilled lay people to craft the prayers each week and connect them to the worship theme and the global and communal context.

Bill H had been writing the prayers of the people during David Martyn's time, perhaps even before that time. After David left and Neil Parker was our minister, Bill started talking about having a team, several answered the call, perhaps there were six in total. They took two workshops to see what format was the best.

Marie Paul, one of our prayer writers, shares: "I remember Bill Hilliard asking me to write prayers for Deer Lake. You couldn't turn that good Christian man down when he asked for something. It was always something for the community, not himself.

"Bill liked prayers written a certain way and it's a format we still use today. He gave us a couple of little workshops, but that structure and framework really does make it easy to write. Scott Turnbrook offered some grace filled opportunities to use lines of hymns or to rewrite Psalms in today's words.

"I'm grateful for having had Deer Lake prayer writing in my life for years now. For me, writing prayers established a practice of quiet prayer in the morning. It has created many peaceful mornings. Sometimes my prayers have been warmed by a Deer Lake prayer shawl, so that I knew as a community we were praying together, whether it was for our children and families or our neighbors here or farther away. We pray together.

Presbytery Representative

Deer Lake U.C. is allocated two lay representatives to attend the monthly meetings of New Westminster Presbytery. As Minister, Rev.Tracy is automatically a member as are student ministers and retired clergy from the fifteen other congregations.

This is an opportunity to participate in presbytery decision- making, planning and oversight. It also makes you aware of the successes, difficulties and plans of other congregations within the presbytery. There is a need for lay people to be part of the democratic process and in some cases play a part on the executive committee.

Currently the monthly meeting is held at Como Lake U.C in Coquitlam, from 5:30 till approximately 9:00pm. It is especially important to keep in touch with the Presbytery Youth and Young Adult Minister so that our valued young people can feel united and supported in their events. A brief report of pertinent items is made to the Board of Deer Lake at their monthly meeting.

Without a representative Deer Lake's opinions thoughts and feelings cannot be taken into consideration. I see this as a revolving position of perhaps two or three years so that more people can get to understand how presbytery and congregations can work together to support each other in changing times.

Mary believes that Deer Lake church is a "live" church which is always changing, both in the physical sense (as seen in the various renovations) and in the human sense, wherein there is a continual flux of people coming and going.

Mary says she has been blessed by her various friends at Deer Lake. She strongly believes that if there is a need, someone from the church will jump in and fill that need. Her case in point was many years ago, during her pregnancy. She and Ron were very excited to be starting their family, but they had no idea that two little babies were spending time together in her tummy. They had their nursery all prepared (for one), and then the doctor told them that there were two babies expected, not just one.

The women of Deer Lake rallied and had an impromptu shower for Mary to ensure that she had enough things to manage both babies when they were born. They filled a need.

Mary smiled when she thought about all the renovations the church has undergone. "I have faced every direction, except East, and they were all good".
