Presbytery Fraud Investigation Continues

In late 2013, it came to light that an apparent fraud had been committed at Westminster Presbytery, with approximately \$65,000 unaccounted for. It was believed that some of the missing funds were allocation payments sent to Presbytery by individual congregations. This fraud is currently being investigated by the RCMP, so no more detail can be shared at this time.

When this fraud became public knowledge in May 2014, the Board of DLUC decided to withhold all further allocation payments to Westminster Presbytery until we were assured that adequate financial controls had been put in place. The Board felt this was appropriate, as we must be good stewards of our congregation's gifts to the church. Our allocation to Presbytery is approximately \$5,600 each year.

In September, the Presbytery Executive held a meeting for all the church treasurers in the Presbytery. At this meeting, the new Presbytery treasurer, Rick Wilson, outlined a set of financial controls which are being implemented to ensure the safety of funds. The proposed controls were thorough, and will serve to protect Presbytery's assets. Therefore, the DLUC Board has now decided to remit our current and past due allocation payments, subject to the proposed financial controls being formally approved at a Presbytery meeting.

DLUC has very good written policy regarding financial management which protects both the congregation's money and the volunteers appointed to handle that money. An incident of theft in the church is sad, but can serve to illustrate how important a system of checks and balances is, and how important it is for those involved in church finances to fulfill their responsibility to adhere to these controls.

Our books at DLUC are completely open for any congregation member to inspect at any time, and any question regarding financial management and practice at DLUC will always be cheerfully received and answered in depth. Documentation for expenditures is always available, and reconciled bank statements are available for review at every Board meeting.

If you have any question about the controls in place at DLUC, or if you wonder about any aspect of how our congregation's donations are safeguarded or spent, please don't hesitate to approach any member of the finance committee (Cathy M, Tony W, Mary C, Kathy R).

Meet Edna and Arnie

Anna, in *The King and I* was right: "Getting to Know You" is precisely my cup of tea and I enjoyed every delicious moment when I was learning about Edna and Arnie Brown.

Edna and Arnie first met while at a dance in Vancouver. Dancing lead to more dancing and then skiing, and finally, on May 31, 1958 they married. They bought a small rooming house in Sapperton and then along came their daughter in 1960 and their son followed in 1962. They bought an apartment block on Arcola Street which they sold in 1969 and they moved to their current home on Fulton Street.

Travel was a large part of Edna and Arnie's lives. They joined a trailer club for 25 years and wintered in Pashe Junction, Arizona. They also spent time in Yuma, Arizona with Mary and Tom C. In 1999, they drove to Mazatlan in their R.V.

They also travelled further abroad: in 1986 they visited Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji for six weeks. In 1990 they took in Oberammergau (the Passion Play), and later visited the Holy Land. They have taken cruises to Panama, and Alaska. Lots of souvenirs!

Edna and Arnie also developed their own interests: Arnie was a Scout Leader and he is an avid outdoorsman. He hunted moose while on horseback and he spent many happy hours salmon fishing with the Drews and the Youngs.

Edna was a member of the Rebekah's (the women's side of the Oddfellows) and she spent one year travelling all over B.C. with Arnie's sister in this capacity.

Edna and Arnie began their church life at 6th Avenue United Church. The lure of the square dance caller brought them to Deer Lake in 1972. There were enough square dancers at that time to make up 50 squares! During this time, there was an amalgamation of three churches and Deer Lake was renamed Central Burnaby United Church. Later, it was renamed back to Deer Lake United Church.

Arnie and Edna have given many hours of service to Deer Lake. Edna was envelope secretary for eight years and she chaired the United Church Women's Group until it folded. She recalled some of the activities that the Women's Group oversaw: catering for funerals, strawberry teas, rummage sales, and a Christmas craft sale that filled the church, including the basement. She commented that the Fall Fowl Suppers in the past also used to fill the upper hall and the basement, with No Dishwasher!!!

Arnie has served as Chair of the Board, and is now one of our handy stewards. Arnie recalled many of the projects around the church: digging out the waterline because of construction, building the ramp, putting bars on the railing, painting, laying gyproc, to name a few. He also recalled a time when the roof leaked because snow had plugged an exterior drain, and the minister found himself getting wetter and wetter during the sermon!



Arnie was part of the "Friday Friars" - the Youth Group at the time, along with Mary and Bill H. Edna remembered the fashion shows that were held in the hall, using the stage (now the Nursery). Frank C also produced a play called "A Streetcar Named Perspire" which was a hit on the stage as well.

All in all, Edna and Arnie have enjoyed their time at Deer Lake. They have made many friends and have seen many ministers come and go. The best part of their church life is what Arnie called the "Common Thread of Congregants". His church family can agree to disagree on certain things and yet still love one another.

I hope you enjoyed "getting to know" Edna and Arnie as much as I did!


